















Do not catch or purchase Job fish and Red Snapper less than 32cm Fork length







Bag Limits

Per fisher/ vessel/ species





To limit the **take** of demersal species and to eliminate competition towards the artisanal fishers



Recreational and Sport fishers

Abide to a bag limit of 20 fish per fisher per day including not more than 5 bourzwa and 5 zob gri



Semi-Industrial vessels


Abide to a bag limit of 20 demersal fish per vessel per trip

Recreational fishers

Abide to a maximum limit of 2 traps per vessel



Commercial fishers

Abide to a maximum limit of 25 active traps per licensed fishing vessel





To limit the catch of rabbit fish during the spawning season

APRIL TO SEPTEMBER

Restriction on spawning sites



Rabbit fish



No more than 6 traps per vessel on spawning sites for seven days spanning the full moon



No traps to be left in the water overnight during spawning season

Enforcement



- The Enforcement Section is responsible for the inspectorate and fisheries supervisory roles, including physical investigations and inspections, as necessary.
 - Stop Board and Search any vessel, facility or person as provided by Fisheries Act, 2014
 - Powers of Arrest and Seizures (Authorized Fishery Officers)
 - Supports Prosecution
- As of 1st October 2022, all noncompliance will result in legal action
- Surveillance (Land, Coastal), Port Inspections (All Fisheries), Post Harvest Inspections (Fish markets, Food Outlets, Hotels, Restaurants)

A person who contravenes the Fisheries (Mahe plateau Trap and Line Fishery)
Regulations 2021, commits an offence and on conviction, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding SCR 20,000
